

APA Quick Guide

The APA quick guide provides basic guidance on how to reference some materials for assessments, for full guidance please visit the Learning Success Hub [Academic Integrity](#) pages.

APA is an Author-Date referencing system, and all statements, arguments, theories, opinions, conclusions etc. taken from another author's work (print, online or multimedia) should be cited, whether the work is directly quoted, paraphrased, or summarised.

APA referencing is a two-part process:

1. *In-text Citations*
2. *Reference List*

In-text Citations

In-text citations consist of the last name of the author(s), year of publication, and page number (if using a direct quotation).

You can include the author(s') names within the sentence, at the start of information:

Jones and Khan (2025) argue that...

You can also place the author(s') names and year in brackets after information:

It is important to include a citation each time you use the words, thoughts or ideas of others (Jones & Khan, 2025).

Reference List

The reference list is a list of all the sources cited in the text. Your reference list must be ordered alphabetically by surname.

In the reference list a book/ eBook should be formatted like this:

Cottrell, S. (2024). *The study skills handbook* (6th ed.). Bloomsbury Academic.

*If the website you are referencing does not have a named author, use the company name instead. If the website has no date, you can put n.d. in brackets instead of the date.
